Holy Father calls for motorists to be more careful on roads

Pope Benedict XVI is encouraging Christians to make an examination of consciences regarding their conduct behind the wheel.

The Holy Father spoke of traffic accidents Sunday in his reflection before praying the midday Angelus with crowds who had gathered at the papal summer residence at Castel Gandolfo, south of Rome.

"Today I would like to propose another prayer intention," he said, "given the news we receive, especially during this period, of numerous road accidents. We must not get used to this sad reality! Human life is too precious and it is too unworthy of man to meet death or become an invalid due to causes that could mostly be avoided.

"There is certainly a need for a greater sense of responsibility, above all by drivers, as accidents are often caused by excessive speed and imprudent conduct," the Holy Father continued. "Driving on public roads calls for moral and civic sense. Indispensable to fostering this is authorities' constant endeavor to prevent, keep watch and restrict.

"Moreover, as the Church, we feel directly involved at the ethical level: Christians must above all make a personal examination of conscience on their own conduct as drivers; moreover, communities should educate everyone to consider traffic as a field in which life must be protected and love of neighbor concretely exercised."

Appunti del Parroco Associato: (From the Pastor's Notebook:)

A Letter from Fr. Michael W. Magiera, F.S.S.P.

Dear Parishioners,

He's ba-aack! Yes, your associate pastor has finally returned. This weekend marks the completion of my first full week back at Holy Rosary. I've given a more or less skeletal outline on my life away from here to the Latin Mass goers but now I'll flesh it out a little bit for all of you.

First of all, do you realize that I spent a full 12 weeks away from you and *la Chiesa del Santo Rosario*? That is a very long time. Kids who were kindergarteners when I left are now preparing for college, baby boys are now shaving; where did the time go?

If you remember, it was the Tuesday after Pentecost (also Mother's Day) that I went home for what I thought was to be just a quick visit to help my mother readjust to life back in her apartment. I hadn't been home since Easter week. I don't know what it was, but something just prompted me to go home just then. Ordinarily, I wouldn't have gone home till the summer, but after all my mother had been through, I followed the impulse to make an unscheduled, advance visit.

My visit turned out to be providential. The very next day, or rather evening, an hour or so after my mother had gone to bed, I heard noises from her bedroom which were quite different from her usual heavy snoring. Her breathing was labored and almost sounded like a series of groans. I tried to rouse her, unsuccessfully. Her eyes were open and she was sweating heavily. She was quite stiff

and her arms started to spasm. I thought, "This is it, she's going to die in my arms." I quickly called 911 and she was rushed to the hospital. She had had a hypoglycemic seizure. Her blood sugar was down to 23! After a relatively short time, she came around, but the hospital decided to keep her overnight. This was another stroke of providence. Though she continued to recover, about an hour prior to my arrival the next morning she started to have more seizures. They put her into intensive care where she remained until I returned to Indianapolis the following Saturday. During the latter part of the week, after prayer, thought and guidance, I made the decision to request a leave of absence to care for her once (or if) she returned home. I realized, and so did she, that she could no longer be completely on her own again. Considering how readily Msgr. Schaedel and the FSSP consented to my request for a leave, and considering how easily my series of substitutes, Fr. Neufeld and Fr. Phillipson, "fell into place," it is obvious that Divine Providence was in control the whole time.

I returned to my mother the following Wednesday, 14 May. I picked her up from the hospital and we returned to her apartment where a painstaking process of recovery began. Life revolved around a very limited scope of things. First and foremost was the bathroom. In fact, the bathroom, the walks to and from and the time spent in it, actually defined my mother's and my life for the next two months. Apart from that, there was the whirlwind of visiting nurses and therapists. There were times, as you can imagine, when they

all decided to come at the same time. The rest of the time I spent caring for her by cooking, cleaning, making around-the-clock bathroom journeys, rearranging shelves and closets, throwing things away (when she wasn't looking), dressing her, walking with her, taking her to doctors. This graduated, when the visiting nurses stopped coming, to showering her, encouraging her, lecturing her, begging her to try things, losing my patience and, God forgive me, being sharp and abrasive with her. Thankfully, that didn't happen much, three times, I think, and I always apologized. But when it did happen, those times were the worst.

Things continued to improve, though, and now, with a few exceptions, mother is able to care for herself. Thanks be to God, she has qualified for what is known as a "waiver program" (paid for by the Pennsylvania Department of Welfare) whereby she receives nursing home care in her home. A caregiver will come every day for an hour-and-a-half to shower her, clean up her breakfast dishes (if necessary; she does a good job on this by herself), "stage" her lunch and dinner for her ease in preparation, empty her trash and recyclables, and straighten up the apartment. One day per week, the visit is three hours because the caregiver will also do my mother's shopping and laundry. With this in place, and considering my mother's toughness and will to live, I imagine she will have several good years left. I thank God every day for that. It's amazing that she's lived this long, really. In her childhood, she survived diseases that killed many others: whooping cough, scarlet fever, diphtheria and rheumatic fever. As an adult, she suffered four different cancers, one resulting in a necessary hysterectomy. In 1976 she was one of the original crew who caught Legionnaires Disease. Among a host of other things, she has had diabetes, two knee replacements, a mastectomy, the recent heart attack, double bypass surgery, cellulites and a hip replacement. Add to that a mar-

riage that was not the happiest and a son who, at times, cared more about himself than anything or anyone else. I don't know about any of you, but I doubt I could survive half of what my mother has endured.

What you now have, though it might not be obvious, is a very different associate pastor from the one you had. Through this whole experience, though I was the one physically helping my mother, it was she who was teaching and helping me. I came out of this experience much better than she did. It wasn't easy and it wasn't very much fun, but I wouldn't trade it for anything in the world. This whole thing enabled me, in albeit a "microscopic way," to give back to my mother some of what she freely and lovingly gave me for many years. I hope that, if any of you are put in the position or faced with the necessity to do what I did, you embrace that opportunity and, once it's in your grasp, hold onto it like a lifeline. That's what it is, a way to get you a little closer to heaven than you normally would be. It makes you realize how small you are because you finally recognize how great God is.

My thanks to Fr. Neufeld and, especially, to Fr. Phillipson for their readiness to serve you in my place. My thanks to Msgr. Schaedel for his graciousness and generosity in allowing me to leave Holy Rosary for a time. My thanks to you for your patience, trust and prayers. Hope you're as glad to have me back as I am to be back.

So begins another week of church renovations – wait till you see the treasures that were uncovered. The Lumen Christi students return tomorrow and life at Holy Rosary goes on. It's pretty wonderful, isn't it? God bless.
