Appunti del Parroco: (From the Pastor's Notebook:)

A Letter from Msgr. Joseph F. Schaedel, V.G.

Dear Parishioners,

November is the month of the Poor Souls. We remember to pray for the souls in purgatory on the **Commemoration of All Souls** and throughout the entire month. Note that we have our customary All Souls Envelopes near the statue of Saint Joseph. He is the patron of a “happy death.”

Write the names of your beloved faithful departed in the spaces provided on the envelope. A monetary offering is optional. Leave the envelope in the basket near the Saint Joseph statue. We collect them often. We will place these names on the altar at all the Masses during November.

This commemoration of all the faithful departed souls in Purgatory was instituted in the Benedictine Monastery of Cluny in the year 993. On this day, the Office of the Dead is recited by the clergy and others who pray the Divine Office (Liturgy of the Hours). Pope Benedict XV granted to all priests the privilege of offering three Masses on this day: one for the faithful departed souls in Purgatory, one for the intention of the Holy Father, and one for the priest's special intention.

Remember to pray for the poor souls in Purgatory all during the month. This is also a good time to visit the graves of our loved ones. Take your children with you. Teach them the vener-

able Catholic custom and obligation of praying for the dead.

Friday, Nov. 7, is **First Friday**. Remember our extra early Mass that morning at 6:30. The **Lumen Dei** Business Guild meets for breakfast and a speaker right after the Mass. This month's speaker is our “own” Carrie Bellock. She will speak about her battle with cancer and her recent pilgrimage to Lourdes. Anyone is welcome. Go to the **Lumen Dei** Web site for more information and to make a reservation: www.lumendei.net.

Monday, Nov. 3, is the day before our national elections. We will have continuous **Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament** all through the day between Masses. (We have three Masses that day, as All Souls is transferred to Nov. 3 on the liturgical calendar for Extraordinary Form of Mass this year.) We beg for the Wisdom of the Holy Spirit upon all voters and all running for political office.

I suspect most of us will be glad when this election is over! It seems like the political campaigning and rhetoric had been going on forever. How much money and hot air has been expended over this election in the past year or so?

I also realize that some want me to stand in the pulpit and tell people precisely whom to vote for. This is not how it works. I would never tell

someone whom to vote for any more than I would tell someone whom to marry. (Although, I confess that I've observed some married couples then wondered, “How in the world did those two ever get together?”)

A second reason I would not mention specific names of candidates or even political parties is that we have no clue what some of these folks will do or not do once elected. No one of them is perfect. Sorry, but the Blessed Mother is not running for office this year.

Yet, I will continue to proclaim the Church's unwavering teaching on moral issues then challenge everyone to decide on the basis of a well-informed conscience. And what do you do if you are a Catholic and you disagree with your Church? Archbishop Charles Chaput of Denver gave the answer to that one when he was interviewed last August: “You change your mind.”

The Church's teaching on all of the major issues in the upcoming election have been articulated clearly in this bulletin, during sermons in this church, in literature available in the back of the church including the *Voter's Guide for Serious Catholics* published by Catholic Answers. The same is true of our archdiocesan newspaper, *The Criterion*.

Let's face it: the major issue in the presidential campaign is the right to life issue — abortion. Allow me to again quote (at length) the very articulate Archbishop Chaput. This comes from an article he wrote recently in an excellent periodical called *First Things*. It's my last word on the elections this time around. May Mary Immaculate, patroness of the United States, pray with our country and for our coun-

try! Here is what Archbishop Chaput wrote in *First Things*:

There's no way for Catholics to finesse their way around the abortion issue, and if we're serious about being “Catholic,” we need to stop trying. No such thing as a “right” to kill an unborn child exists. And wriggling past that simple truth by redefining the unborn child as an unperson, a pre-human lump of cells, is the worst sort of Orwellian hypocrisy — especially for Christians.

*Abortion always involves the deliberate killing of an innocent human life, and it is always, inexcusably, grievously wrong. This fact in no way releases us from the duty to provide ample and compassionate support for unwed or abandoned mothers, women facing unwanted pregnancies, and women struggling with the aftermath of an abortion. (Comment from Msgr. Schaedel: **Stewardship in Action:** When you support our **United Catholic Appeal** this month, you help us do precisely this here in Indianapolis. Please help!) *But the inadequacy of that support demands that we work to improve it. It does not justify killing the child.**

Obviously, we have other important issues facing us this fall: the economy, the war in Iraq, immigration justice. But we can't build a healthy society while ignoring the routine and very profitable legalized homicide that goes on every day against America's unborn children. The right to life is foundational. Every other right depends on it.

Efforts to reduce abortions, or to create alternatives to abortion, or to foster an environment where more women will choose to keep their unborn child, can have merit — but not if they
