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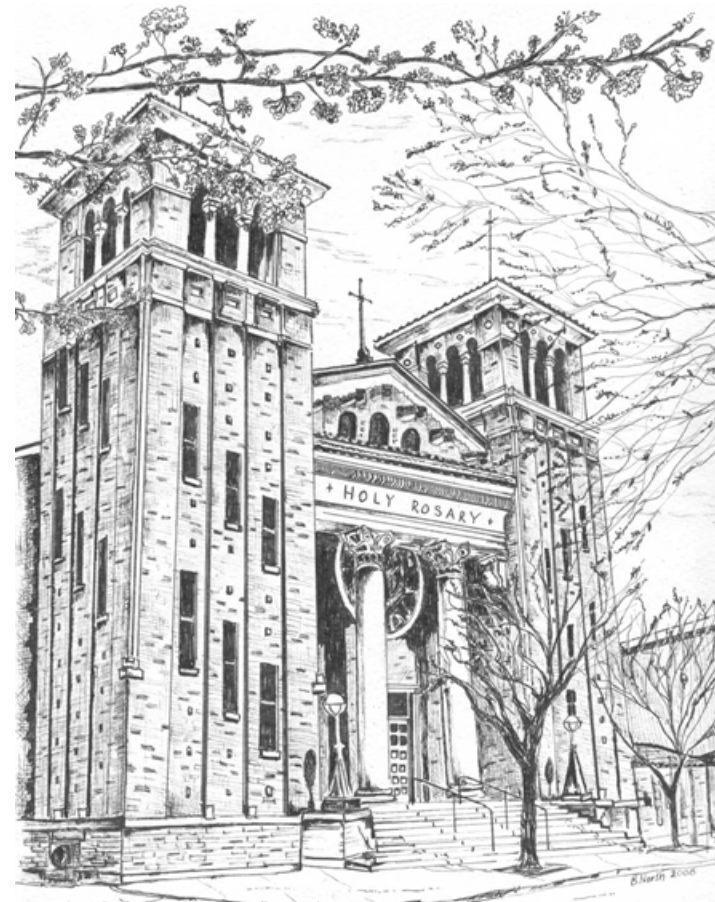

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(which I've done once and probably won't do very often) I am required to take the Host from the ciborium myself. But when I just go to Mass, I always receive the Sacred Host on the tongue, while kneeling. I believe this shows the greatest respect and reverence possible to Our Lord.

Remember, no one is worthy to receive Holy Communion. But Our Lord wants us to. Thus we must always show Him the greatest reverence possible in an attitude and posture (you probably won't understand this now, but you will later) of total receptivity, humility and even vulnerability — to be totally dependent on Christ in the Holy Eucharist. What could be more receptive, humble or trusting or vulnerable (helpless and defenseless) than the act of kneeling? What could be more reverent than not even daring to touch the Sacred Host with your hands? That's why I receive Our Lord only on my tongue, while kneeling.

Girls — and boys, too, in warmer climates — wear white as a sign of purity. You have to be as pure as possible to receive Our Lord. White is the color of purity and innocence.

Out of the mouths of babes. God be with you, my children and my friends, as we begin the month honoring our Patroness, Our Lady, Θεοτόκος (*Theotokos*), the Mother of God.

• Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday are **Rogation Days** in the extraordinary form of the Roman liturgy — prescribed days of prayer and penance in the spring. Adapted under Pope Leo III (reigned 795-816), these are considered the "Minor Rogations" and occur annually on the last three days before Ascension Thursday. (The "Major Rogation" is April 25, the Feast of St. Mark.) They were instituted to appease divine justice, ask for protection and invoke God's blessing on the harvest. "Rogation" derives from the Latin word, "rogare," which means, "to ask."

Appunti del Parroco Associato:

A Letter from Fr. Michael Magiera

Dear Parishioners,

Once again, I got to grab the brass ring and write this week's bulletin letter. This is a job I always enjoy very much. It is certainly a bitter-sweet blessing to be able to write the letter on this Mother's Day weekend but also a joyous blessing to write on the weekend of our annual May Crowning.

This will be Monsignor's and my second Mother's Day without our dear mothers. As I imagine Monsignor does, I talk to my mother every day at least once — usually before I begin my bedtime prayers. I tell her how much I still love her and how fiercely I miss her and how much I look forward to seeing her again. Sometimes I brashly say that sooner would be better than later. Of course, I realize that, once I begin my bedtime prayers, it will be God who determines when I'll have that singular, heavenly joy.

Mother's Day is also bittersweet for the two other priests who share the cathedral rectory with Monsignor and me. It will be Fr. Bonke's third Mother's Day without his mother and Fr. Donohoo's first without his.

Today should be a time for all of us to be profoundly thankful for the mothers we had, if we've lost them, and to take advantage of each precious moment we can devote to them now, if we're privileged enough to still have them. Happy Mother's Day to all Holy Rosary moth-

ers and all mothers visiting our parish this weekend.

This will be Our Lady's second "coronation" here in the span of four days. The Lumen Christi students so honored her on Thursday afternoon. It brought back memories of the "old days" when I was growing up in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. That was a time when most parishes, especially suburban ones, were growing exponentially and each parish had a school that got more crowded with each passing day.

In those days May Crownings were very much a communal, parish event — in every sense of the word — and on a May Sunday afternoon. Since all parish schools had grades 1 through 8 (possibly with two classes for each grade), and since the May Crowning was at the end of the school year, it was always the coveted honor of one of the eighth-grade girls to be "May Queen."

No one really knew how she was chosen — a secret tradition that comes down to our day. And, if one knew what was good for him or her, he or she never messed around with finding out how the decision was made — especially parents and most especially the "he" type persons. Back then (and, thankfully, today) men instinctively knew that such important work was always left to the ladies to decide. It always seemed to be the right girl, too. Funny how Monsignor's Providence thingy works

out. And yes, you may have guessed it, my sister was chosen to be May Queen at Our Lady of Good Counsel School in May 1968.

Two weeks ago we celebrated another very special occasion at Holy Rosary when 13 young people received Our Lord for the first time in Holy Communion. Two young ladies and one young man received at the 9:30 Mass and 10 received at the noon Mass.

All who received their First Holy Communion honored Monsignor and me with thanks and appreciation. Many of them were actually in a group which presented us with a lovely gift and cards. The cards also had questions for us, and we decided they were important enough to answer in the bulletin.

This exercise presents a good opportunity for all of us to learn a bit more about our Faith — not only from Monsignor's and my answers, but also from the questions the First Communicants asked. We can't include all questions, of course. And some questions were duplicated on several cards. Naturally, we won't mention the names that go along with the questions. To those of you who are old enough, remember what Art Linkletter used to say? "Kids say the darndest things!"

Monsignor will publish his answers next week. So, without further ado, here are mine:

1. Has Our Lord or Our Lady ever appeared to you? Who is your favorite Saint?

I have never been so fortunate as to have Our Lord or Our Lady appear to me so that I could see them. Yet Our Lord appears to me every day at Mass when I consecrate the bread and wine. Our Lady comes to me when I call on her

for help. I have a few favorite saints: St. Michael, St. Cecilia, St. Peter and St. Augustine.

2. Is it hard to speak Latin? How can you speak it as fast as you speak English? And why do you sweat so much?

Learning to speak Latin is as hard or as easy as you want it to be. In speaking English, you speak more Latin than you realize every day. I started learning Latin in high school. I continued in college and in seminary. Because I use it all the time, I'm "in practice," and speaking it quickly is easy. If I got out of the habit of using it, I would lose that ability quite quickly. I sweat because, well, I'm too fat. Also because I wear a lot of vestments and the electric lights and the burning candles make the sanctuary very hot.

3. When did you become a priest and is it fun to say Mass and to give Holy Communion?

I became a priest on 21 May 2005. I wouldn't say it's "fun" to say Mass, because it goes much deeper than that. Do I enjoy it? Well, yes, but it's not really "fun." Same with Holy Communion. It's a privilege.

4. You hold the Host when you give out Holy Communion. Why do you receive the Host on your tongue? Why do girls wear white dresses?

When I celebrate Mass and when I give out Holy Communion, I hold the Host, of course. The priest is "another Christ" and his hands, Christ's hands, change the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ. For that reason, I believe only the priest, with the Hands of Christ, should touch the Body of Christ. The hands that consecrate should be the only ones to touch. If I concelebrate with other priests
